"The old court-and-chase ritual is very animalistic, so if you rush into sex you lose this exciting element and may be left disappointed."

## ONE WEEK


"If you sleep with someone after a week it's impossible to know them very well," says Emily Dubberley, author of *Brief Encounters: The Essential Guide To Casual Sex* (Fusion Press, £10.99).

"In this instance, the first time a couple has sex they might feel embarrassed about communicating their sexual needs."

**A fiery future?** "Even if the sex isn't great after seven days, it has the potential to be amazing once you get to know each other better," says Dubberley. "If you're upfront and honest, say what you want and take the time to learn about each other's bodies, you could have a fantastic sex life together," adds Sadie Allison, 'pleasure coach' and author of *Tickle His Pickle!* (Tickle Kitty Press\*). She also suggests you choose a non-intimidating place, such as the park or a coffee shop, to talk about what turns you on.

## ONE MONTH

A recent Durex report found almost a quarter of people globally would have sex with a new partner within a month. "In our culture, it's a normal amount of time to wait," says Phillip Hodson, sex therapist and author of *How Perfect Is Your Partner?* (Carroll & Brown, £12.99). "If you've been on four or five dates, the sexual tension has had time to grow. You've probably already shared a few kisses and cuddles and have a good idea about how suitable the guy is and whether you want to take the relationship further."

**A fiery future?** Your love life will involve plenty of orgasms – and laughs. "After a month, you've built up the anticipation and showed awesome willpower," says Allison. "You should be comfortable enough with your new partner to handle any unexpected mishaps in bed." A word of caution: "People make less effort to get to know each other once they've slept together," says Dubberley. "Don't be lazy and substitute sex for communication."

## THREE MONTHS

"There's a lot to be said for waiting three months before having sex," says Gash. "By that point it's not sex, it's making love. You're familiar with your partner's strengths, weaknesses and flaws and you're still keen to sleep with them." Dubberley agrees that it's time well spent: "The wait can be beautifully romantic."

**A fiery future?** "Be careful not to lose the momentum," says Gash. "After three months there'll be expectation there and the build-up can be better than the sex itself. Try not to expect too much – if you don't assume the earth will move you won't be disappointed. First time sex with anyone can be awkward, however long you wait. On the plus side, if he's prepared to wait three months it shows he's not just in it for the sex, he's more likely to want a long-term relationship."
